Demons), creating a waterfalls, paying homage to Shuford Mills, remembering historical events, and recognizing people from Granite Falls who have made history. The Committee will announce specific rules in the near future (neighborhoods

beyond the city limits to be included, prizes, identify of judges, how to enter, etc.). They hope this early article will give people time to get ideas and purchase supplies.

#### Family Treasures

The Granite Falls History Committee has begun saving genealogies, newspaper clippings and other papers that contain information about local families such as births, deaths, weddings, graduations, job promotions, awards, photos of families and their homes, etc. in a dedicated file located on the first floor of the Granite Falls History and Transportation Museum. The goal is to provide a "go to" treasure trove for genealogists, historians, and others seeking information for various needs. The file will also preserve historical documents, allowing future generations to see the styles and culture of various time periods.

Just before his death a few years ago, Wayne Bud Moore, a former resident of Granite Falls, donated over seventy genealogies he had meticulously researched to the museum. Last year, Eddie Sipes gave his collection of newspaper clippings, photos, and other documents to the Granite Falls Historical Association. Earlier this year, Sam Erby donated copies of *The Granite Falls Press*, which contain news about local government, businesses, civic clubs, schools, and families.

The museum recently acquired additional filing cabinets, and committee members hope to expand the collection. They urge people going through old papers related to the Granite Falls area and consider donating them to the Granite Falls History and Transportation Museum. Once destroyed, they are gone forever.

### Family Stories and Oral Histories

The Granite Falls Historical Association is assisting with the collection by soliciting family stories and oral histories to be preserved in a choice of three formats - audio, video, or printed. Anyone is welcome to share stories about people, places, and/or events related to our area - Dudley Shoals, Grace Chapel, Granite Falls, Northlakes, Rhodhiss, and Sawmills. Unless otherwise requested, interviews will take place at the Granite Falls History and Transportation Museum.

#### Help Wanted

In order to keep the museum open on a regular schedule, the Town of Granite Falls needs volunteers to open/close the facilities and to be available to assist visitors. The museum is only open on Sundays from 2 until 4 p.m., except on holiday weekends, but we could open on Saturdays with enough help. Guides are normally assigned one two-hour shift per quarter, but they can make arrangements to work more or less. Volunteers receive on the job training with an experienced guide for one or two sessions plus a resource manual with basic information about the history of Granite Falls and some of the items on exhibit. Persons interested in serving as guides at the museum should call the town office at (828) 396-3131.

Please note: Last minute emergencies may mean, no one is available to open the museum when scheduled. Please feel free to call the museum at (828) 396-2792 to make sure someone is there before you go. Also, some members of the History Committee are available through the week to provide tours. ### WEATHER UPDATE From Too Little to Too Much

Last month's newsletter noted the lack of rain in June 2024. One local resident recorded a total of .65 of an inch that month. His records for July show 4.95 inches. He went from having to water the garden several times a week to mowing when the sun came out long enough to dry off the grass. These are not official weather records, but they show the difference between the two months.

### North Carolina Department of Transportation Projects Update on North Highland Avenue

On October 4, 2018, the North Carolina Department of Transportation held a public hearing in the Granite Falls Town Council Chambers to inform local residents about "SR 1109 (Pinewood Rd) from SR 1252 (Bert Huffman Rd) to US 321. Since the description does not mention North Highland Avenue, some residents of that street were shocked to learn the state would be taking part of their land to make a right turn lane onto Pinewood Road. The DOT also planned to widen Pinewood Road and build a roundabout where the road intersects with Bert Huffman Road. Surveying began in December 2018, but the stakes fell down. Law firms sent ads to affected residents hoping to negotiate right of way purchases. Right of way agents closed most deals in 2022 and 2023. Surveyors returned on February 13, 2024, and a contractor tore down the hundred year old house on the corner of North Highland and Pinewood a few days later on February 19. Photos of the house being torn down appear in the February 2024 issue of *The Granite Tablet*, and the photos below document other work that took place in 2024.

In April, contractors began setting up new utility posts on both streets to allow for widening of the roads. This photo was made April 18, 2024

#### PUTTING WORDS INTO ACTION "Love thy Neighbor"

On July 15, 2024, a residence in Granite Falls became a camp site for Carolina Cross Connection, a non-profit organization with a double mission - to provide a great learning experience for youth and their leaders while helping them connect to real people who can use their help. In addition to worship, team building, and fun activities, their campers assist with home projects- minor construction (wheelchair ramps, porches, steps/handrails), minor exterior painting, and yard work for people in Alexander, Alleghany, Ashe, Avery, portions of Burke, Caldwell, Catawba, Dare, Gaston, Lincoln, portions of Mitchell, Watauga, and Wilkes. The home in Granite Falls needed a new porch.

Campers began their week on Sunday afternoon, July 14, with orientation and team building to prepare them for their assignments. A youth group from Milford

Hills United Methodist Church in Salisbury arrived at the home of Shirley Richards in

Granite Falls on Monday morning and began tearing down her front porch and steps. They were able to replace the porch floor and posts in the allotted time, but heavy rains and unforeseen problems prevented them from completing the porch in their allotted time, so a team from Backyard Fellowship in Charlotte finished up on Friday. Foothills Service Project, in Rutherford College, assisted with the rebuilding of the porch by providing the plans and building supplies.
